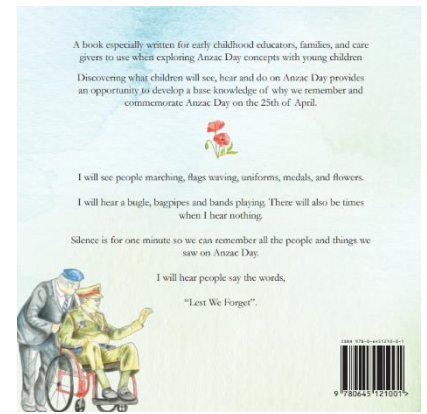


What Will I See On Anzac Day?

Discovering what children will see, hear and do on Anzac Day provides an opportunity to develop a base knowledge of why we remember and commemorate Anzac Day on the 25th of April.

I will see people marching, flags waving, uniforms, medals, and flowers.

I will hear a bugle, bagpipes and bands playing. There will also be times when I hear nothing.

Silence is for one minute so we can remember all the people and things we saw on Anzac Day.

I will hear people say the words,

“Lest We Forget”.

We recognise and acknowledge the traditional custodians of the land and pay our respects to First Nations members. We acknowledge past and present injustices and express our deep respect and gratitude to First Nations people who have contributed to the Defence of Australia in times of peace and war.



What will I see on Anzac Day?

I will see medals on Anzac Day.



Medals are worn by people who are, or were, in the Navy, Army or Airforce on the left side of their chest.

Family members and friends can also wear the medals on the right side of their chest.



What will I see on Anzac Day?

I will see horses and dogs walking in the parade on Anzac Day.



Horses, dogs and other animals are a part of the military and help with jobs like carrying food, water and other essential supplies.

What will I see on Anzac Day?

I will see flags and banners waving on Anzac Day.



What will I see on Anzac Day?

I will see people, young and old, marching together on Anzac Day.



Some will be in wheelchairs and cars, while others will be walking.
